THE SLEEK AND speedy Aifos (+39. 0584.38191, www.cbinavi.com) is a stunning new showpiece for the Italian yard CBI Navi, which the Fipa boatbuilding group acquired in 2005. The 164-foot vacht, which was delivered last July, utilizes an aluminum hard-chine hull with a semiplaning structure and a pair of 4,200 hp MTU engines to reach a top speed of more than 20 knots. CBI Navi had every piece of furniture aboard Aifos custom built for the yacht, which sleeps as many as 14 guests. Interior highlights include leather floors in the salon, raw metal surfaces, and wavy laser-molded plastic walls in several of the communal spaces and guest rooms. Add in ample deck space for lounging and an eight-person top-deck hot tub, and Aifos is the ideal bachelor pad on the water. -B.S.B.

THE DUTCH SHIPYARD Heesen completed seven yachts in 2011, of which Quinta Essentia (www.heesenyachts.nl; available for charter through Nakhimov, www.nakhimov.com) was the standout. Delivered last June as the largest yacht in the 34-year-old builder's range, Quinta Essentia sports a redwine-colored hull in reference to the owner's passion for Italian wines. The yacht's commodious aft-deck spaces are covered with canvas awnings for shade, while the forward main deck and the top-deck hot tub and seating area provide several areas exposed to the sun. The yacht's exterior highlight is unquestionably the aft main deck's 1,850-gallon pool, which sprays a 10-foot-wide water curtain from 3,000 tiny jets to separate the pool area from the bar. So that Quinta Essentia's

12 passengers do not feel cramped in the yacht's interior, Heesen employed circular designs for many of the communal spaces. If *Quinta Essentia*'s guests do get stir-crazy, the yacht offers several options for escape, including a pair of WaveRunners and Seabobs and a custom 25-foot limousine tender. —B.S.B.

Galileo G (+39.0187.28371, www.perini navi.it) is the second launch from the Vitruvius line of explorer yachts, which is a collaborative effort between naval architect Philippe Briand and Italian builder Perini Navi. (The first Vitruvius yacht, Exuma, was last year's Best of the Best award winner in this category.) Delivered last October, the new vessel measures 183 feet in length and sports an ice-class-certified hull. Galileo G also boasts an impressive 9,000-nautical-mile range and an environmentally friendly design that allows it to traverse fragile coasts and berth in marinas with strict emissions policies. The trideck explorer accommodates 12 guests in a maindeck master suite, four belowdecks staterooms, and a main-deck gym that converts into a cabin. Alfresco space is plentiful on the foredeck and aft main deck, the latter of which can be fully enclosed in bad weather. The yacht's three tender garages house a 31-foot rigid-inflatable boat, a 21-foot Smuggler, and a 14-foot rescue tender, plus two Lasers and four kayaks.
